PAGE 3 APPENDIX IN PAMPHLET KNOWN AS ELRUM

On November 14, 1968, a pamphlet known as Elrum (Elton Avenue Revolutionary Union Movements), Volume I, No. 1, was distributed at the Elton Avenue Auto Plant. This first issue indicated that it was an outgrowth of the organization known as "URMP". Statements in this issue were as follows: "We Will Be Energized", and one article was entitled "The URMP Road". The mailing address of 3651 Grand River appeared in this issue.

On November 30, 1968, Volume I, No. 2 of the Elrum pamphlet was distributed at the Elton Avenue Auto Plant. On page 3 of this report the following threats were directed at one of the following supervisors: Fred Leon, Larry Kipp, and Charles Alford - "If this U.P.M. does not back up with his bullshit the company is going to find him laying in a puddle available sucking water and his feet pointed towards the sky". This was followed by the words "This is an official warning; pack your next sleep in this accident prone factory. The eyes of the black workers of revolution are upon you".

Following the distribution, Mr. Alford and his wife received a total of five anonymous telephone calls at their home, in which the caller threatened both Mr. and Mrs. Alford, using words such as "Don't leave home or something will happen to you or your wife". Mr. Alford took these threats seriously, and had decided not to report for work until interviewed by this investigator. Mr. Alford was seriously considering the sale of his home, stating he wanted to move out of his present neighborhood because of the threats.

On December 12, 1968, the writer in the company of Detective Sgt. Charles Colgrove of the Special Investigations Bureau - Detroit Police Department, went to the offices of Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor James Garber, Chief of the Recorder's Court Division, for an opinion as to the violations relative to the printed threats in the Elrum pamphlet. After reviewing the pamphlet and discussing the matter at length, Mr. Garber stated there was no criminal act that could be sustained in the Elrum threats and recommended that Chrysler Corporation seek relief through an injunction.

On December 17, 1968, Volume I, No. 3 of an Elrum pamphlet was distributed at the same plant. On page 3 of this pamphlet a foreman referred to as "Ray - a pollack employed in Department 309", (apparently referring to General Foreman Raymond Kwapiel), and at the end of the article discussing Ray, the quotation appeared "Watch out pollack bastards. Elrum is watching you".

On December 23, 1968, Volume I, No. 5 of the Elrum pamphlet was distributed at the plant. This printing bore the mailing address of 9069 Oakland Avenue. This address is listed as the Black Arts Development Center, a division of the North Woodward Interfaith Corporation.

Incidents in Elrum pamphlet

Recent editions of the Elrum pamphlets also bear the same mailing address. On page 2 of the Elrum paper, a safety man employed on the second shift in Department 79 is referred to. (The safety man in this department is Mr. Gary Vaughn.) The statement "This honky safety klumman had better watch his step", followed by the words "You will be ambushed" appeared.

January 9, 1969, Volume 1, No. 7 of the same pamphlet was distributed and on page 1 the names of four foremen at the plant appeared. They were as follows: Israel Myslinski (correct name Grzegorz Valosko), General Foreman - Department 18; Tony Crotti, General Foreman - Department 69 and 27; Henry Sobeski, General Foreman - Department 72; and Jerry Blair, General Foreman - Department 69 and 27. The paper stated "Disciplinary action will be taken against the following four in this order". The article concluded with the words "Lord have mercy on their souls" and "Fight - Fight, Fight Against Right unto victory - Long live black people in this racist land - Death to their enemies". Following distribution of this paper, Mr. Valosko received an anonymous telephone call at his home, in which the caller stated "We will be waiting to get you and when we do we will kill you".

Page 4 of the same pamphlet referred to the doctor at the Eldon Avenue Plant as "The no english speaking fellow that some people call a doctor", and "The Witch Doctor". These statements apparently referred to Mr. H. Aboassaly, M.D., Eldon Avenue plant physician. The writer interviewed Mr. Aboassaly, who was seriously concerned regarding such allegations being printed about him and indicated that he wished to take some personal civil action against those responsible.

On January 16, 1969, Volume 1, No. 9 of the Elrum paper was distributed at the plant and an article on page 1 referred to a union officer on Local 961 - a Mr. John Bennett. The article stated "He must be removed by any means necessary", and "Death to the traitorous toms". On page 2 of this pamphlet, Mr. Poplawski, a foreman, was referred to and the words "This is one of his final warnings. Treat our brothers right or look for another home to receive your mail" appeared.

This investigator has interviewed all the supervisory personnel that have been mentioned in the Elrum papers and all have taken the threats seriously; not so much as to fear of their own safety, but fearing for the safety of their families while they are at work. In most instances, the local police departments in the areas where the supervisors live have been notified of these threats and are giving special attention to the homes of the supervisors. Mr. G. H. Peters, Chief of Plant Protection - Eldon Avenue Axle Plant, has instituted procedures whereby special attention is given to supervisors leaving the plant, especially during night hours.

THE DRUM ROAD

More and more Black workers are finding it necessary to take the D.R.U.M. road. That is the road of Black independent revolutionary action in addressing the terrible conditions that they labor, on their respective jobs. Since D.R.U.M. has been in existence, Black workers from all over the state have come to us with their stories of monstrous conditions in the plants and seeking our help in launching D.R.U.M. type organizations where they work. This situation has developed because Black workers realize that only through this kind of movement can relief be obtained from the oppressive conditions that take such a heavy toll. Black Brothers are reporting that at Ford's conditions are so bad that the men are holding prayer meetings on the assembly lines. At the Pontiac plants, Brothers are being forced to fight back because the work is so hard and degrading. Of course, it is widely known that conditions at the G.M. plants are abysmally inhumane. They too have contacted us. D.S.I. bus drivers have contacted us for assistance in helping them do something about their plight. And this is going on all over the country as more and more Black workers are finding themselves in intolerable situations. The only thing needed is a program that can unify all these Black workers, and channel this rage into a confrontation on a massive scale, with the boastfully super-exploitative racists responsible for their plight. D.R.U.M. has such a program. Our program evolved out of the experiences that we gained working on those lines. It recognizes and identifies racism as the common-denominator that will unite all Black workers, but it also goes further and identifies our enemies as the racist U.S. government, and greedy racist owners and operators of the means of production in this country, and the no one tool of management, the racist union bureaucracy, as well as the complacent white-worker himself.

FORD REVOLTS REACHES PLANT LEVEL

Five Detroit area corporations will receive awards from the Detroit branch of the National Urban League for their "outstanding" work in providing "equal employment opportunities." The companies, which will receive the awards

Friday night at the Sheraton Cadillac, are Chrysler Corporation, the Ford Motor Company, General Motors, the Army Tank Automotive Command, and Motor Record Company.

The granting of the awards has created a furor in the Black community. The automobile companies have recently

launched by revolutionary Black work-

ers against the racist policies of that

and Chrysler's Jefferson Assembly

Plant.

Black workers are protesting the racist hiring and upgrading policies of the corporations, as well as increasing "Neggeration" in the plant. (Niggeration" is hiring a Black man and making him do the jobs previously done by three white men.) A DRUM member, on hearing of the awards, commented, "This is an outright insult to hundreds of thousands of Black workers who are being oppressed and exploited by the racist, imperialist, monopoly capitalist automobile corporations. At the very moment that we are pressing our attack against the number one enemy of the Black community, the Urban League decides to lay praise upon them. The Urban League was born

in the days of Uncle Tom organization,

Uncle Tom organization, will die an Uncle Tom organization."

Black revolutionaries are concerned that the Urban League is giving an award to Molown, a recording company frequently criticized for exploiting Black entertainers, and the U.S. Army, one of the major forces used to keep Black people in their place during racial relations.

BLACK WORKERS STRIKE

January 27, 1969, beginning at 5:35 a.m., pickets appeared at the East Gate, Jordan Gate and main gate of Sidon Avenue Auto Plant. They bore signs and were passing out literature.

The literature stated:

Strike your Blow against Racism. Do your Part. No Work Today. Black Workers Strike. Only Racist Hippies and Uncle Tom's Traitors Work Today. Rally to be held Today, 13305 Center at Davison. Upstairs. Refreshments.

The signs read:

1. Liberation of Black Workers is Liberation of the World.
2. Black Strokes for Black Folks.
3. Black Workers Power.
4. Stamp out Armos and Andyism.
5. Every Black G.I. is a Damn Fool.
6. Tom Lives.
7. To Hell with Racism Pigs - We will Win.
8. Warning - Do not Work.
9. Stamp out Tomism. No Work Today. This sign carried a picture of a buttocks with the name "Larry Kipp", and underneath, "Do not Kiss".

The writer observed these pickets forcibly stop colored employees from entering the plant by blocking their paths and surrounding them and telling them "You don't want to be a Tom - don't go in there, etc." This type of action was taking place at all three gates. The only person the writer could positively

identify was General Gordon Baker, Jr. In the morning he was at the Jordan Gate with a large group of supporters within 25 feet of the gate. His activity at this time was handing out the above literature, and he appeared to be remonstrating with cultural employees who were attempting to enter the gate.

On this same date at about 4:00 p.m., the writer in company with a Detroit Police photographer, was in the vicinity of the Jordan Gate and observed General Gordon Baker and about six others talking around in a circle on the corner of Jordan and Linton Avenue. Their position was approximately 20 feet from the Jordan Gate. Mr. Baker had a sign hanging on his coat.

ELRUM PICKETS

DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF INCIDENT (IDENTIFY PERSONS WHERE POSSIBLE)

At approximately 5:22 AM, 1-27-69, Pickets from the ELRUM began to appear at the Eldon Ave Axle Plant gates. They carried placards denoting the following: "Long live heroic black power struggle" "No black labor-No white profit" "Black strokes for black folks" "We are going ELRUM-All racist honkies & Toms out of the Plant" "Be a man strike back only uncle Toms and aunt Susies work today" "Stop racism now" "Help get our suspended black brothers back". They also carried a Black, red and green 2x3 flag.

Pickets at gates: Main gate - 5:22 AM, 7 males - 1 Female 6:00 AM, 20 males - 2 Females 1:00 PM, 1 male - 2:00 PM, 6 males, 1 Female - 3:00 PM, 8 males, 1 Female - 10:00 PM, 20 males, 3 Females.

EAST GATE: 5:27 AM, 6 males, 2 females - 6:00 AM, 25 males, 1 female - 1:00 PM, 1 male, 1 female - 2:00 PM, 8 males, 1 female - 3:00 PM, 6 males, 1 female - 4:00 PM, 8 males, 1 female 10:00 PM, 25 males, 4 females.

JORDAN GATE: 5:25AM, 19 males, 12 females - 2:00 PM, 12 males, 9 females - 3:00 PM, 19 males 6 females - 4:00 PM, 20 males, 6 females - 5:00 PM, 1 male, 1 female - 10:00 PM, 7 males, 5 females.

ACTION TAKEN (STATE IF NOT TAKEN BUT INTENDED OR RECOMMENDED)

Detroit City Police were notified at once - they responded. Made security checks of all Eldon Ave Axle parking lots periodically, driveways and approaches kept clear to ensure proper in-plant traffic, insure safety of all employees.

Plant Protection man power increased, parking lot patrols increased, gates locked to ensure safety of employees, automobiles, etc. Perimeter patrols increased along with patrol of the inside of the Plant.
