

MARXIST CLASS ANALYSIS

What the bourgeois or ruling class wants the common workers to accept:

- 1. The rich are richer than the masses because they have worked harder. So they deserve the extravagant, luxurious life they lead.
- 2. Everybody can become rich like them: save and work more and harder.
- 3. The middle class means everybody, or almost; it includes the autoworkers, steel workers, judges, doctors, janitors, congressional and legislative representatives, the President, the farmer, you and me.

Any person who is unable to enjoy the wealth the rich do is in that position because we do not have the will, the courage, or the ability.

5. The poor are stupid, lazy, and don't have the courage to work. Look at them: when you give them money they waste it on Cadillacs, booze, etc. They deserve their fate. Anyhow they would not be in this situation if God desired it to be otherwise.

Class analysis outline:

1. BOURGEOIS (Industrial, Commercial, Financial, Agricultural)

A. Bourgeois owns the means of production

1. materials (instruments of production): natural wealth (forests, mines, oil, gas, rubber, animals, tim, etc.) or semifinished products which undergo a transformation.

equipment: everything needed to convert materials into

finished products (buildings, machines, tools).

B. Bourgeois buys the labor power of the workers and appropriates (takes for their own use) all of their production in return for a wage or salary; surplus value, the source of profit, is created in this process.

C. Bourgeois controls the entire productive process but he does no

productive work himself.

D. Bourgeois wants to make profits. To do this:

1. They look for real human needs to satisfy markets.

2. They create, through advertising, additional markets by psychologically manipulating masses of people to desire products they have no real need for. That is, they create a false needs in people. Cost: 15-20 billion () annually.

3. They develop strategies to obtain raw materials to process to satisfy these needs and the equipment to manufacture them.

4. They accumulate money, capital, either from their own business, other bourgeois through financial institutions (banks, insuranc companies), state subsidies/contracts, religious institutions, et

5. They buy the labor power of workers (women and men of all ages) needed to produce commodities (A commedity is a product

which has exchange value in the market place).

5. With these components the wheels of capitalism can now be set in motion. The bourgeois sells his commodity at a price that allows him to pay for his materials and equipment, to repay the capital he has borrowed, and to pay his worker's wages/salaries, At the same time he keeps enough to satisfy his own needs and to expand his interests.
