THE F.R.U.M. ROAD

The Revolutionary Union Movement (R.U.M.) started in the late 60 *s as a reaction to opressed and exploitation of Black workers within the plants. At Dodge Main (D.R.U.M) was the first one started, later R.U.M. movements started at plants around the Detroit area. FHere at the Ford Rouge complex, F.R.U.M. started and at Chryslers plants were Eldon gear and axle (E.L.R.W.M), Jefferson Assembly (J.A.R.U.M) and other plants around the Detroit Area. The old R.U.M. movements had a very positive aspect in that they organized workers into a force to get something done. But why didn't the old R.U.M. movements lasts ? Because firstly, the old R.U.M. groups were all black, for all blacks and agains't all whites, despite what those whites did, where they worked, depite thetfabtsthat whateseparates different groups of people in this society. in talation to the positions others people hold in this society. It cannot be denied that the whole of the working class is exploited to one degree or another, and the current overproduction crisis has even made its presence felt among the people in higher income brackets. Exceeding Proper Limits

What ever happened to the seven (7) wildcat strikers who were fired on May 11, 1968. The ridiculous and corrupt U.A.W. attempted to tell the fired strikers that their hands were tied until a strike vote was taken. Such was done. Next the Black workers were told that nothing could be done until the vote was sanctioned by the international staff of the UAW. We were never given an answer on this question. Futhermore, we wore given a whole lot of oo-bla-doe about why the strikers could not be reinstated. At the general membership meeting in August, 1968 the Local 3 structure exposed a deal which it had made with the racist Chrysler Corporation on bringing back five (5) of the strikers while leaving two (2) of our Black brothers in the streets. The Black membership shouted such a ridiculous deal down with the cry of "all back or none back". Let's take note that while the U.A.W . used all of the proper limits to keep two (2) of our Black brothers out of the plant, since September they have moved to exceed those proper limits. In September and October the Local 3 structure has attempted to stifle all dissent by not holding membership meetings so that the Black membership can voice its just decision.

What has happened? Last week five (5) of the fired strikers were re-hired; a sixth was approached to come back to work, but

our other brother is still in the streets. Why? Because he is Black, and these policys are made by white racists. D.R.U.M. takes the position that since Local 3 has moved to exceed the proper limits, from no-hold-barred policy in dealing with the white racists in control of this plant. We are therefore asking all of our Black Brothers to prepare for a bitter prolonged struggle; get ahead on bills, save up on food as we prepare to get down and wipe out every pocket vestige of racism that exists here.

TO BE ATTACKED BY BOTH THE UAW & CHRYSLER CORP. IS NOT A BAD THING BUT A GOOD THING/...report from HUBER AVE. FOUNDRY.

The Black salute is rising with the Black workers struggle for the liberation of Black people. Unity is surging forward because the distinction is being made/who is for the working man who listens to the grievances of the Black workers? the unjust treatment that is allowed to be put on the Black workers day-in and the mad struggle for production is the hope of the Black wo-ker must put out but receive none of the benefits. DRUM is the hope of the Black worker and it loudly proclaims and real-izes that only a struggle led by Black workers can triumph over racism and exploitation.

Why is it that Drum has become famous all over the country? Because, of all the anti-racist organizations, it is the most revolutionary, the most progressive, and the best fighter for the liberation and social emancipation of Black people. DRUM is revolutionary and progressive because both its membership and leadership and its program are revolutionary and progressive. without this character, it could never lead the Black workers and win the praise of revolutionary people in this country as well as abroad. Both the UAW and Chrysler Corp. have attacked DRUM: they are racist and do not want to see Black workers united. This only goes to show that DRUM is a most revolutionary and progressive philosophy, or otherwise they would not attack it. The attack at the local union hall by the racist Hamtramck police put up by both Chrysler and the UAW testify to Drum's revolutionary nature and add to its victories. We hold that is is bad as far as we are concerned, if a Black person, a Black political party, or a movement is not attacked by the enemy, for in that case it would mean that we have sunk to the lovel of the enemy. The is good if we are attacked and wildly painted as utterly black and without a single virtue, since it demonstrates that we have not only drawn a clear line of demarcation/a line of seperation between the enemy and ourselves but achieved a great deal in our work. The educational policy of the program of DRUm is to cultivate a firm and correct political orientation, an industrious and pure style of work, and flexible strategy and These are three essentials in the making of an antiracist revolutionary worker. It is in accordance with these essentials that the leadership of DRUm teach and the workers study.

In the first place Coon, a man's handwriting is no indication of how he'll work, and secondly it's not your job to even tell a person such Bullshit, you know that they are hiring every ablebodied man that they can get their hands on, and they don't care how well he writes.

Later that day a Bro. walked up to his window and ask if he could see Mr. Kotes, this coon told the Bro. "that he could be a little more mannerably and say excuse me" before talking to him. Well Bro. Young that Bro. just happened to be one of the few Bro. who started D.R.U.M., and in all probability had it not been for the actions they took in fighting the Racist policies of the Chysler Corporation, your big black uncle tomming ass wouldn't be sitting in the employment office trying to prove to your white master how much you hate us ignorant, uncouth, culturally deprived niggers. It's ashame that the brave revolutionary black bro., who got out and fought this racist system, and some uncle tomming coon like you pops up to reop the rewards of your brothers struggle, and then you sit around and look down on the very people who are responsible for your being where you are. at all, but that he would go and check the job out himself When he got to the line, the Brother called on expert witnesses who told Simson the same thing as the Brother.

But the word of th-

ese witnesses who work on the job year in and year out was not enough to satisfy Simson. So the next day Simson said that he

would have to lay the Brother off for three days for the worst crime at the Ford jail - refusal to continue a job.

HIRING POLICY AT FOMOCO.

At racist Ford Motor Co. when a black brother is hired in he's either sent to the coal mine (Dearborn Iron Foundry) where life's expectancy is 20 years and no more or the auction block (Dear-born stamp-ing. Dearborn Engine) but to top it off he gets the ax and sent to the Back Breaker (the frame plant, or B. Bldg.) now that's not really much of a choice. Those bldgs. mentioned are predominately black where as once upon a time they were 70% to 30% in favor of white but since they required hard physical work they have rapidly become almost totally black with no advancement for any of the black brothers no matter how intelligent, only toms

since the Racists of Fomoco has made those particular bldgs. 90% black then the white collar personnel should be 90% black and not 1% as it is in the Dearborn Engine Bldg. The biggest laugh of the century is when jobs are posted for the bid and all the honkies advance and as usual the black brothers are left with that not enough senority shit. We of F. R. U. M. also would like to, know why no black brothers get put into the rolling mill, or glass plant or on Racist Ford's testing grounds where the big buck is ? the final analysis in fomoco's hiring policy is meant to keep the black man down in industry.

Jailer, Ford Motor Co., and its guard, U.A.W., in the Dearborn Assembly plant, Dept. 5357 conspired to have a Black brother laid off on a false charge of refusal to work.

But this is how it really happened. When this Brother returned from a sick leave he found out that there was a new operation added to his job, which was a danger to his health, "physically and, most of all, mentally."

So he called the

foreman to report this poor, unsafe condition. And the foreman told him that some mad engineer ordered this extra standard to get better results from this job and that he could not cut this extra standard from the job. even though other workers who work the final line 8 to 9 hours everyday had told him of this unsafe job.

The foreman told the Brother at 5 P.M. that he would send for the engineer's associates

to check the job out. and that he would call for the committeeman on the Brother's request. So the Brother waited 'like we have to' and nobody came to see him, it was about 10 P.M. when he came out of the pit, and ran down the line to see the foreman, who told. him that he couldn-'t get anyone in the office. So the Brother asked him to come to the pit so that he could show him why he could not continue to work under these
